Students help give life to old cattle farm in Hopetoun

More than 100 hectares of land near Hopetoun has been converted into a wildlife haven through a partnership between South Coast Natural Resource Management (NRM), Water Corporation and Hopetoun Primary School.

Last month, students, volunteers, and Water Corporation staff planted around 4000 native trees, including endangered species, as part of an ongoing partnership to rehabilitate the former Springdale Cattle Farm south of Hopetoun.

Water Corporation Regional Manager Adrian Stewart said the planting project was an important part of a program to further protect drinking water catchment areas.

"Water Corporation purchased the site in 2010 with a view to gradually rehabilitate the area so we can better protect nearby water supply bores for the Hopetoun community," Mr Stewart said.

"This tied in perfectly with the goals of South Coast NRM and Hopetoun Primary School as students were studying the local environment.

"I would like to thank everyone involved, especially the enthusiastic students, who braved the weather to participate in planting and help improve their local ecosystems."

South Coast NRM Project Officer Robyn Cail said the group had worked with Water Corporation since 2014 to successfully revegetate parts of the property to restore natural linkages between the Jerdacuttup River and coastal wetlands.

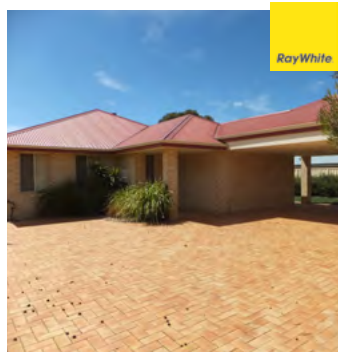

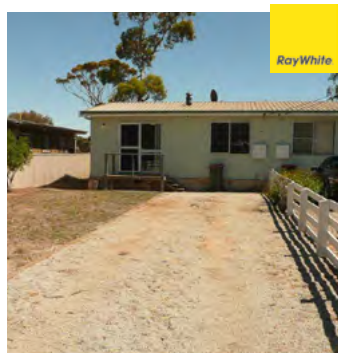

"The rehabilitated corridor is an important haven for species like the endangered Carnaby's Black Cockatoo and Honey Possum, as well as restoring the banksia dominated 'Proteaceae Dominated Kwongan Shrublands Threatened Ecological Community (TEC)," she said.

"We are already seeing flocks of over 300 Carnaby's Black Cockatoos feeding in the vegetation planted in 2014-15.

"Water Corporation should be very proud of the key role they have had in this partnered project with South Coast NRM, which is proving to be a leading example for highly successful biodiversity restoration techniques."

Hopetoun Primary School Principal Brendan Murray said the vegetation project was a wonderful opportunity for students.

"We have been learning about native vegetation and planting local species at our school, so being included in a real-life, larger, scale rehabilitation project that benefits our town was a great opportunity for students," Mr Murray said.

A recently installed camera trap, specially designed to capture images of the types of birds and animals attracted to the newly rehabilitated area, is the latest addition to the project.

South Coast NRM will continue to work with Water Corporation staff to provide technical guidance about managing revegetation sites, and is seeking funding for future revegetation programs at the site.

This project was supported by South Coast NRM, through funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program.

kludge noun | KLOOJ

Definition:

: a haphazard or makeshift solution to a problem and especially to a computer or programming problem

Did You Know?

The first recorded use of the word kludge is attributed to Jackson W. Granholm, who defined the word in a 1962 issue of the magazine Datamation as "an ill-assorted collection of poorly-matching parts, forming a distressing whole." He further explained that it was derived from the German word klug, meaning "smart" or "witty." Why Granholm included a d in his spelling is not known. What we do know is that speakers of American English have agreed to disregard it in pronunciation, making the vowel pronunciation of kludge reflective of the pronunciation of German klug (ˈKLOOK). We can also tell you that not everyone agrees with Granholm on the "d" matter: the spelling kluge is also popularly used.

The house, was allocated to Windspray Arts as an arts space by First Quantum Minerals when the group moved from the Maitland Street shop. The venue has already hosted some interesting workshops and events including the Art for Waste Awareness Project and Woodblock Printing.

Judy, Kerry and Corina are normally at work in their Ravensthorpe premises, Crazy Granny's. Lynnell has artwork for sale at Colour Farm in Ravensthorpe and is frequently at DunnArt Studio and Gallery painting, and organising workshops and exhibitions, while Louise and Beryl work on their artwork and run workshops at Windspray Arts in Hopetoun.

Showcasing an impressive 55 moons, the imagination, creativity, variety and interpretations of the participants works, who were asked to create and design their very own moon using any medium - is quite a sight to see.

Moon sculptures, dioramas, paintings, moons made from concrete, paper mache, lego, plastic waste, a stop motion animation film, a magnificent moon cake and an ice moon are just some wonderful examples of what is on show.

Everyone who attended the Opening Exhibition also had the opportunity to observe Jupiter and its four largest moons, along with Saturn's Rings and the Full Moon in all its glory, thanks to Professor Kevin Vinsen from the International Centre for Radio Astronomy Research. Kevin gave us a galactic presentation on the wonderful world of astronomy, then helped us explore our galaxy first hand with his amazing Skywatcher Dobsonian Telescope.

Take a tactical approach to in-season nitrogen applications

■ GRDC

How much nitrogen should be applied in-season? That is the burning question many Western Australian grain growers are currently contemplating following recent rains which have triggered a revision of the outlook for yields.

After the late start to the season, rainfall in many parts of the State in June has spurred growers into activating growing season nitrogen (N) application programs in a bid to capture water-limited yield potential.

Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) manager of agronomy, soils and farming systems – west, Rowan Maddern, advises that growers need to consider a number of factors in their fertiliser decision making in an effort to match a crop's N requirements.

"Knowing the status of existing nutrient levels and any change in yield potential is important in determining how much nitrogen should be applied," Dr Maddern says.

"It's a balancing act – growers don't want to miss out on capturing yield potential but they also don't want to be spending money on inputs if a return on that investment is not likely."

Dr Maddern says growers should consult with their advisers about any review of their nutrient programs, and recommends plant tissue testing as a useful in-season tool to refine initial recommendations.

The GRDC also has available to WA growers a suite of Western GrowNotes™ publications for all crop types which offer information on in-season application of N.

The Western Wheat GrowNotes™ includes a 'best-bet nitrogen strategy' and a decision tree for in-season N applications according to the progress of the season and crop developmental stage.

The publication states:

- Match wheat N requirements as the season unfolds. Even in low rainfall areas, potential yields can vary between less than 0.5t/ha and more than 4t/ha. Implementing a best-bet strategy to account for this yield variation limits fertiliser costs in poor seasons and forgone yield in good seasons.
- A best-bet nitrogen strategy pivots on sowing the crop with enough nitrogen for a low or average yield. If the season continues to be dry there is enough nitrogen applied at sowing for the expected yield. If the season continues as poor there is enough nitrogen applied at sowing for the expected yield.
- During late tillering, if an average or better season is developing, apply more N at first node to match the new water-limited yield potential.
- From stem elongation to ear emergence, further assess the season. If it seems average or drier, apply no more N. If it is wetter than average, apply more N but still observe

the requirements of moist soil and a reasonable prospect of follow-up rain.

The Western Barley GrowNotes™ states:

The pattern of crop demand for N during the growing season should be considered. The highest demand is when the crop is growing most rapidly.

Most responses to nitrogenous fertiliser in WA are the result of an increased number of ears or grains. The response is largely caused by increased tillering, which is determined early in the life of a barley plant. The number of grains per ear is also determined early. Therefore, a good supply of N is needed early in crop growth.

Early application is preferred in the production of malting barley because it is more likely to increase yield without raising grain protein levels. The other consideration is that in sandy soils in higher rainfall areas, the application should be split or delayed 3-4 weeks. This allows the crop to establish a reasonable root system and avoid large leaching losses.

The best time of application in any one season can vary depending largely on the incidence of leaching rains in relation to time of application. Profitable responses can often be obtained up to 10 weeks after sowing. Late applications are more likely to result in increased grain protein.

Meanwhile, the GRDC has recognised that the impact of incorrect N applications results in several issues for WA wheat growers, primarily relating to grain quality.

Dr Maddern says growers are asking how they can capitalise on good seasons in time to make more profitable nitrogen decisions, thereby making optimum nitrogen applications for protein and best economic response while maintaining or increasing yield.

"Growers at GRDC Western Regional Cropping Solutions Network (RCSN) open forums in 2018 highlighted that they lack the tools and knowledge to make profitable in-season decisions, which they consider to be a constraint to their profitability," he says.

"To address this issue, the GRDC is investing in a new western project, 'Tools for growers that can enable best practice in-season nitrogen management to optimise economic returns and grain protein.'"

Running until early 2021, the project's outputs will include nutrition masterclasses in the Esperance, Kwinana East and Kwinana West port zones, providing growers with a summary of N cycling and availability within a cropping season and enhancing their understanding of the basic requirements to improve cost-effective fertiliser decisions and ultimately grower profitability.

Other outputs from this new investment include new resources for growers and consultants to aid in N decision making to optimise economic returns.

Small business affected by drought

Small rural businesses are urged to contact the Rural Financial Counselling Service of WA (RFCSWA) if they're finding business conditions difficult.

Rain might have taken some of the heat out of dry conditions on the south coast, but small businesses are likely to still be feeling the impacts of drought, according to RFCSWA Chief Executive Chris Wheatcroft.

He said rural small businesses operate under a unique set of conditions, which can become really challenging if the wider agricultural community is impacted by a poor season.

"We tend to see farmers tighten their belts during poor seasons and crunch down on any unnecessary spending," Chris said.

"That will even occur if there is the anticipation of a bad season, which means that local small businesses also feel the pinch."

Small rural businesses are an integral part of our country towns—they create employment opportunities and can be a much needed source of donations to local clubs and events.

"When businesses suffer or are forced to close in rural areas it can be devastating, not only to the business owner, but for the whole community," Chris said.

"There are a lot of pressures on small business operators, and if they become stressed it can impact their ability to manage some of the issues that arise.

"Things can quickly become difficult and that's where RFCSWA can help."

Beekeepers explore forests & fuel management

Last week, WAFarmers Beekeepers Section together with Forest Industries Federation of WA (FIFWA), and experienced local foresters, spent the day travelling around Collie to look at forest management and different ways of managing forest fuels which can complement prescribed burning in the South West Jarrah forests.

WAFarmers Beekeepers Section and FIFWA inspected an area of Jarrah forest that had undergone a process of mechanical fuel reduction, where thinning of trees was completed to reduce the fuel load to slow the travel of a bushfire.

"This would seem to have less of an effect on beekeeping and

honey production than a prescribed burn every 4-6 years. Over time the canopy of the trees left would grow larger and honey production may not be affected." Stephen Fewster said.

"Our visit included the Wellington Discovery Forest where trial thinning has removed excess regrowth and left the forest more resilient in response to climate change" FIFWA Acting CEO, Matt Granger said.

"We also investigated an area that had a cool prescribed burn where Jarrah trees had buds on and will flower and may produce honey 12 months after the burn.

"In the same burn where it

was hotter there were no buds on the trees. This may not flower for another 2-4 years." Stephen Fewster said.

Brendon Fewster, on behalf of BICWA thanked Matt Granger for organising the tour.

"It was great to look and discuss forest issues with other forestry minded people. The mechanical fuel load reduction method has great potential.

"The sites we visited were only very young and time will tell if this method can deliver its objective. It was a very positive experience and one we should continue to work on to see what role it can play in helping the beekeeping and forestry industries."

Brendon Fewster said.

WAFarmers Beekeepers Section will be approaching government to trial this experiment in more areas around towns and major assets in the South West, and we look forward to working with FIFWA in the future.



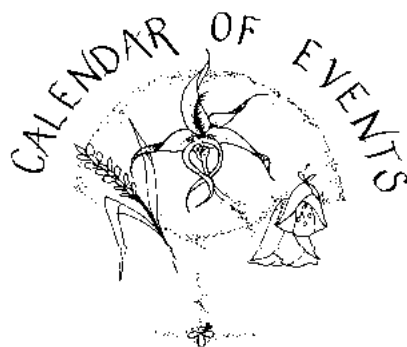

Did you know—Footy?

Developed by three cricketers in the mid-19th century as a way to keep fit during the winter, AFL is influenced by early forms of soccer and rugby.

However, it has also been suggested that footy was influenced by Marngrook, a traditional Aboriginal game that sees players kick a ball - made of animal skin that is stuffed with charcoal or feathers - high into the air.

Having developed in Australia and becoming a nationally recognised sport played by two teams consisting of 22 players each (only 18 players are on the field at once), footy is now played by over 100,000 people across 80 countries including South Africa, the USA, Canada, Denmark and Sweden.

In 1910, two Carlton players - Doug Fraser and Alex Lang - were both found guilty of bribery, resulting in a suspension lasting 99 weeks each. This record suspension has not been witnessed since; however, North Melbourne player Fred Rutley was reported six times in one match against Geelong in 1925 - two kicking, three striking and one melee - resulting in an 89-week suspension.
